Clindora attended the public schools of Accomack County, Virginia. She continued to educate herself through reading and hands on skills. She was a domestic engineer with a passion for baking and sewing. She admired the wonders of nature from her kitchen window and contributed by planting and gardening around her yard.

Clindora, at an early age, confessed her love for God and became a member of Shiloh Baptist Church. She always sang the goodness of the Lord within the walls of her home. Later she sang these praises on the Senior Choir and when requested, as a soloist. She served as a Willing Worker, a Missionary, a member the Culinary Committee and of the Golden Age Ministry. Silently, Clindora gave to many charities like the Cancer Society, the Boy Scouts,

NCPSSM and many more. All these things she did until her health no longer allowed. But she sang unto the Lord just days before her death asking him to “Pass me not oh Gentle Savior” and the Lord heard her humble cry.
