### Obituary

Elwood A. Armstrong departed this life on Thursday July 8th 2021 at Hartley Hall Nursing Home. Elwood was born to the late Joseph E. Armstrong and Mary Tull Armstrong in Pocomoke City, Maryland.

Elwood was never too busy for conversation, and displayed an extreme philosophical bend toward his talks. He never tired of talking. He received his education from the Worcester County school system.

Elwood graduated from Claflin University in Orangeburg, South Carolina where he was a member of the Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity. He then served in the United States Air Force and was honorably discharged in 1955. He was employed thereafter by the U.S. Postal Service until 1981 and retired to Vineland, N.J. In 2013 Elwood moved back home to Pocomoke City, Maryland.

He leaves to cherish memories, his brother Aspinall Armstrong of Brooklyn, New York.; a special and longtime friend Mrs. Eartha Hubbard of Orangeburg, S.C. a host of nieces and nephews and cousins.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his brothers Joseph William and Jessie Winfield and G. Inez Gammon.
