



Harry Lee Perdow

July 2, 1946 - August 10, 2013

Harry Lee Perdow was born July 02, 1946 in Berlin, Maryland to the late John and Lalie Predeaux (adoptive parents) and the late Lee Andrew Galloway and Elizabeth Faison Hanna (birth parents). He was raised in Pittsville, Maryland and met and married his wife of 47 years, Diniece “Niecy” Fortune, and fathered two children: Marchel “Chelly” Woods (Clarence) of Miami, Florida; and Somia Hickman (Richie) of Silver Spring, Maryland; and raised his niece Nicole Robinson. He departed this life on Saturday, August 10, 2013 after a lengthy illness.

Harry was a 1965 graduate of Salisbury High School and joined the army soon thereafter, where he achieved the rank of E4, specialist in electronics. Harry received several commendations for his service such as the Good Conduct Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, and a Sharpshooter (rifle) citation. After his honorable discharge on January 14, 1972, he began his 30+ year career in water and wastewater treatment, working for the cities of Ocean City, Salisbury and Ocean Pines, before retiring after 19 years of service from Showell Farms.

Harry lived a full life- he raced motorcycles and cars, followed NASCAR, bowled, shot pool, played table tennis, basketball, and fished. He was a member of the American Legion Post 145 and the VFW Post 10159. Most importantly he loved talking to people on many topics- sports, politics, religion,

and “life” were his favorites. He also knew and loved the Lord and recognized it was God who granted him a new kidney in 2006 and ushered him through the final years of his life. Harry became a member of St. James AME Zion Church under the leadership of Rev. Dr. M. Luther Hill.

In addition to his wife and two children, he is survived by three brothers (Yarnell and Don Hannah, and Ray Perdow); three sisters (Annette Predeaux, Debbie Perdow, and LaVonne Purnell), four grandchildren (Taché Woods and Mia, Xavier and Mischa Hickman); two great-grandchildren (SáRiah and Caleb Woods); five sister-in-laws; eight brother-in-laws and a host of nieces, nephews and cousins.
