They cherished having more time to spend with family and friends, especially their grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

James was young at heart, defying his chronological age. He had a zest for living and thoroughly enjoyed life. He loved to eat and had a particular weakness for soul food. He held dear memories of the foods he grew up eating in Virginia and found those foods irresistible. James had a great appreciation of music and a prized collection of "oldies but goodies", which he eagerly shared with family and friends. Whether rolling down the highway in his treasured truck, or relaxing at home in his mancave, he had his music at his side.

As a high school student, James was a member of the football team. His passion and enthusiasm for sports remained with him throughout his life. He delighted in watching many genres of sports. He was enthralled with cars and often told stories of his car racing days in Virginia. Also fascinated with motorcycles, he was a true biker who belonged to a motorcycle club in Philadelphia. Needless to say, he simply adored and appreciated cars, trucks, and motorcycles. He even collected the traditional Hess toy trucks.

James was very sociable, easy-going, and politically conscience, which was evident through his financial support of President Barack Obama. A fun fact about him is that he wore matching outfits with his wife. You could always pick
