Janie Cornelia Farrow-Adams entered into eternal peace on Monday, March 24, 2014 at Mallard Bay Convalescent Center. Born in Dorchester County on May 24, 1914, Janie began her long journey through life. She was the seventh child of the late James and Janie Farrow. At the time of her death, she was two months shy of her 100th birthday.

Janie (also known as "Little Janie" to some) received her education from the public school system in Dorchester County. She spent most of her adult life doing domestic work for various families in the Hurlock, Maryland area. She also worked in a few of the local food processing facilities. Janie was a member of Hurlock United Methodist Church. She attended services regularly until her health began to fail. She loved to sing and was a past member of the church choir. She also enjoyed listening to good gospel music. During her younger days she was an active member of the United Methodist Women and served as a communion steward for her church.

Janie was preceded in death by her parents, James and Janie Farrow; as well as four sisters, Leola Farrow-Fletcher, Frances Farrow- Sampson, Nellie Farrow-Allen, and Nona Farrow-Dotson.
