“Snap,” as he was affectionately called by family and friends, received his education in the Mitchell County School System in Georgia. Snap immediately went into the work force after completing school. He married the love of his life, the late Edna “Honey” Everett, on Saturday, June 28, 1969.

Snap loved riding motorcycles and fishing in his spare time. He also enjoyed traveling and that is how he began working as an over-the-road truck driver. Everyone who met Snap fell in love with his contagious laugh and sweet spirit. Additionally, he enjoyed spoiling his grandchildren.
