



Lillian Rae "Lily" Scott (Gibbs)

January 9, 1923 - May 27, 2019

Lily R. Scott was born on January 9, 1923, to the late Walter and Edith Gibbs in Chesapeake City, Maryland. She passed away peacefully on May 27, 2019, at Transitional Care Nursing Home in Elkton, Maryland.

Lily graduated from William Penn High School in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She worked for many years as a factory worker in Philadelphia.

In 1962, Lily married William Oscar Scott. The ceremony was performed by Elder William Pugh.

Lily gave her life to God at an early age. Elder Scott visited Mt. Olive Holy Temple in Philadelphia where she heard Bishop Ida Robinson preach the Gospel. She felt the power of God in her life and desired to live for God. She was called by God to preach her first sermon at the age of 20. She became a member of Mt. Olive, taught Sunday School, and sang in the Evening Light Chorus.

In 1963, she went to Los Angeles, California, to be with Elder Evans to do missionary work, teaching the love of Jesus. Elder Scott taught two generations of children, on Concord Road, their Easter speeches and traveled with them to various churches to participate in programs.

Elder Scott founded and pastored Faith, Hope and Charity Church, from 1975 – 2014. Elder Scott was a pioneer in the ministry for 71 years.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Walter and Edith Gibbs; husband William Scott; siblings, Mary Henson, Rosie Hamilton, Evelyn Gassaway, Arleatha Tiler, Lizzie Gibbs, Herbert Gibbs, Joseph Gibbs, Layton Gibbs, Walter Gibbs, Elzie Gibbs and Justice Gibbs.

She is survived by her only, and very devoted child, Brother David Scott and one sister in-law, Catherine Scott; a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, friends and church family from Faith, Hope & Charity and the Mid-Atlantic District.
